

What have religion and belief to do with the historic landscape? Simply put, the historic environment is the result of human action, which is always conditioned by beliefs. This applies in particular of course to ritual and religious sites, monuments and buildings, but extends to the manifestations of beliefs and superstitions in everyday life and things.

The Bronze Age ritual landscape on Farway common that we see today is the result of a belief system, no doubt with ritual as well as territorial and socio-political dimensions. In succeeding historical periods, religious belief continued to be linked to territorial concerns. Our familiar parish system for many centuries concerned not only the cure of souls but also local administration, the care of the poor and the sick, and education.

Our landscape features not only churches but has also includes crosses and chapels, and until the reformation, abbeys and monasteries, together with the quarries that produced the stone. Until the 19th century church income depended on control of an agricultural surplus, from church lands and tithes. Whilst Catholic or Anglican churches dominated the parish for many centuries, 'nonconformist' chapels subsequently became a familiar part of town and village landscapes, and popular superstitions have never quite disappeared.
