

#### **Natural Environment**



Pond Walk on 4<sup>th</sup> July 2007

Eleven of us started out from Joney's Cross car park, a good access point for Aylesbeare Common, to visit a selection of ponds and explore their wildlife.

The previous year's walk in the area had shown us that two of the ponds there are lifeless, and probably anaerobic, so this year we concentrated on the two near the SW corner of Woolcombe plantation before moving on to a group of ponds constructed along a shallow valley to the NW of the first group. These latter have been formed by a series of low earth dams built across a seasonal stream. They can be reached quite easily by following a broad track that runs roughly N from the "lone pine".

The best map reference I can give for these latter ponds is: 0550 0905. They are in a thin copse of trees. To approach from any other direction is fraught with problems, all wet and muddy. There are 5 ponds in this chain but I must confess that I have never found more than 4.

Norman Crossland proved a great help, both with his pond net and his professional knowledge.He notes the following: -

"Potamogeton natans" (broad-leaved pond weed) was the dominant emergent plant.

"Alisma plantago-aquatica" (water plantain) was present in the last of the ponds.

Water boatmen, nymphs of darter dragonflies, damselfly nymphs and Whirligig beetles were the abundant species of invertebrates; newts and tadpoles were also plentiful.

Obviously, these are only a few of the many plant and invertebrate species that live in these ponds.



On the wing we saw the Common Blue damselfly, and a number of dragonflies including the Common Darter and the Blacktailed Skimmer. Bird life was not conspicuous on this warm July morning. Altogether an enjoyable and rewarding walk.

The South West Coast Path is Britain's longest National Trail, running from Minehead in Somerset to South Haven Point near Poole Dorset, passing though Budleigh Salterton.

The path takes in some of the most dramatic scenery in the UK - there are plenty of gentle stretches as well as dramatic headlands, steep coastal valleys, sheltered estuaries, busy harbours, intimate coves and moorlands.



The wildlife is equally varied and interesting and our speaker, Martin Catt, has a wide knowledge and experience including all major groups of flora and fauna, and also geology and archaeology, with particular interests in butterfly ecology and behaviour, terrestrial orchids, reptiles and amphibians, fungi, and prehistoric archaeology.

Martin has over 30 years experience of leading successful wildlife holidays and courses both in UK and abroad, as well as conducting many illustrated talks and guided walks covering numerous wildlife subjects. A former rocket scientist, over the last twenty years Martin has successfully turned his interest in natural history into a full-time profession.

I hope you are able to come along to what promises to be an excellent talk to start out 2007/2008 programme.



#### **Footpaths**



About half a kilometre west of Stowford House are 2 ponds, down in a deep hollow under trees. A leat passes through them and a bridge takes the walker over one of them. A delightful spot. The approach from the north is fairly level with just a shallow sheet of water to cross. On the south there is a flight of steps to take you up or down.

Well there used to be. But water and wear have taken the steps out and in their place are gulleys which are very difficult to clamber through, perhaps even dangerous.

I have long wanted to replace the steps but they are not on a right of way so I am not allowed to spend the parish's footpath money on them. You are of course allowed to walk there: it's part of the commons. I tried to persuade the AONB partnership to do something about it but they do not have funds for employing contractors on the commons.

Now it looks as if Clinton Devon Estate has come up trumps. I don't have any promise but Bungy Williams, the commons warden, tells me he is considering putting the steps on his current program of work on the commons. This program is being carried out by the probation service under the supervision of Bungy.

He has already extended several boardwalks to the east of Woodbury Castle and another north of Upham's Plantation. These had been overcome by rising water. One even had a sheet of corrugated iron unsuccessfully trying to take walkers across one of the gaps.

Bungy is looking for other jobs the probation service can do on the commons, preferably not involving great expenditure on materials because his budget is under pressure. I have suggested 2 possible jobs but I believe other suggestions would be welcome.

Clinton Devon has a deserved reputation for maintenance on the commons and they have employed the probation service there before. The probation service has also done work on rights of way in the past. When Dorothy Stammers was in charge of footpaths in Colaton Raleigh she was told she would never get the bridleway on the south side of Hawkerland cleared. I tried to walk it and found it impossible. Dorothy was possibly the first to call the probation service in, and they did a wonderful job. Since then they have done quite a lot of work, especially in Otterton.

### Can you read a Map and use a Compass?

If not, we have a Workshop just for you!! On organised walks, I suspect most of us just happily follow on behind the leader, but how would we fare if we found ourselves lost in unfamiliar surroundings, with no-one else to take charge? Join us to learn how to pinpoint landmarks, use Grid Refs, read the terrain, find out one's own location and the required direction of travel. This is not aimed at only "serious" walkers but a worthwhile, even educational exercise for anyone who would enjoy learning about maps and how best to use them.



Many of you will remember the very interesting, recent talk on "Aspects of Dartmoor" given by Tony Burges. Tony is an authorised Dartmoor National Park Guide, holds a Mountain and Moorland Certificate and leads groups all over the West Country and as far as the New Forest, focusing on all aspects of history and nature. Tony has kindly agreed to spend an evening giving OVA members some instruction on how to use an OS map and a compass. This will be followed by a field trip over the commons, putting theory into practise!

You would ideally need to bring an Explorer map no 115, (Exmouth & Sidmouth), a compass (although there may be a few spares), a ruler, pen/pencil and notepad. #### Conservation Trust and Book Launch

A new conservation trust has been launched in East Devon at Woodbury Castle, Woodbury Common.

The East Devon Pebblebed Heaths Conservation Trust has been formed by Clinton Devon Estates as an independent charity to manage the ongoing conservation of the East Devon Pebblebed Heaths and the Otter Estuary. Both Sites of Special Scientific Interest. Trustees have been appointed and include Professor Denys Brunsden OBE, responsible for the successful application to UNESCO to nominate England's first natural World Heritage Site – The Jurassic Coast and Pete Gotham, renowned ornithologist.

The Trust was officially launched by Lord Clinton. John Varley Trustee and Director of Clinton Devon Estates commented "The Trust is a transparent body, engaging with local communities, schools and regional and national conservation bodies. The Trust will continue the work undertaken by the Estate with regards to wildlife and habitat management to help maintain and improve the biodiversity in the area. Significant gains are expected as the Trust has been awarded one of England's flagship 10 year Higher Level Stewardship agreements by the government."

To tell the story of the Heaths, a book which has been commissioned by the Trust was also launched. The book entitled "East Devon Pebblebed Heaths - 240 million years in the making" has been written by renowned BBC wildlife film maker and author Andrew Cooper

Andrew Cooper commented "The story of the Pebblebed Heaths is indeed a rare and fascinating one. The book allows the reader to travel back through time to the dawn of dinosaurs, discover monsters and myths, and reveal a dramatic history of the people and lives of a land that still bears the scars of war. Out of it emerges a

landscape of exquisite, wild beauty still privately owned yet free for all to enjoy – this is the amazing story of the East Devon Pebblebed Heaths."

The book has been reviewed by Fiona Reynolds, CBE, Director General of The National Trust and she commented "This is a fascinating insight into the geology, landscape, people and wildlife of the East Devon Pebblebed Heaths. It brings the past to life in an enlightening way which engages with people."

#### Colour Newsletter - Would you pay more?

In the course of preparing the Newsletter over the last few editions Pat Quaife has made major improvements through the inclusion of photographs and more graphic material. The next logical step was that we should investigate the use of colour. However, at this stage we have come up against a major stumbling block – cost.

After investigating the alternative ways that we might print each edition we have found that there is a threshold quantity under which it is just not economic to produce a colour version or even include some colour in the Newsletter and that threshold is very high. The various costs we have found are:

Black and white - 36p per copy Black and white inside with a colour cover - 83p per copy Colour throughout - £1.82 per copy

These costs are for the quantities we produce at the moment but even a significant increase in the print quantity would have only a marginal effect on the unit cost. There seems to be no alternative to black and white with subscriptions held as they are today at £3.00 for an individual and £5.00 for a household.

However, in saying that we are making an assumption i.e. that Members would not wish to pay higher subscriptions and receive a colour Newsletter. Hence the title of this article. I would like to hear your views.
